DISASTER AND NATIONAL IMAGE

- ODisasters may damage the image of a country and its standing in the eyes of the international community
- O Donors have aided developing countries to overcome disasters. When such aid cannot be <u>utilized effectively</u>, <u>the recipient country earns a bad name even if there are valid reasons for under-utilization</u>
- If the disaster-stricken country is ill-prepared and is tardy in intimating donors about <u>the nature of assistance</u> required, <u>misunderstandings may arise</u>.
- Recipient nations may <u>feel they are being forced to</u> make hasty decisions leading to misunderstanding, and they may appear to be incompetent in the eyes of the donors.

DISASTER AND NATIONAL IMAGE

- Such events not only <u>tarnish image</u> <u>but have</u>
 <u>repurcussions on national development</u>
- ODonors may become reluctant to offer aid
- O Internally, the government may come under intense political pressure and scrutiny and instability may follow





IMPACT ON NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- o Immediate Effects on Contemporary Development
- Long-term Effects on Long-term Development





IMMEDIATE IMPACT ON DEVELOPMENT

- O Disasters may affect crops, livestock, fertility, transport capability, commercial offices, workers and staff
- Production and distribution would be hampered
- A single disaster may wipe out much of the GDP





LONG-TERM IMPACT ON DEVELOPMENT

- Loss of export markets
- O Lost Resources need to be renewed/rehabilitated
 - Communications infrastructure
 - Power supplies
 - Housing
 - Water supplies
 - Health and community facilities
- Sequence of planning and implementation of national development may be upset
 - Current plan may be disrupted
 - Forecasts of development program may become difficult
 - Next plan may become difficult to formulate
 - Resources are diverted from development programs

LONG-TERM IMPACT ON DEVELOPMENT

- Donors may divert funds from development assistance programs
- Long-term unsuitability of land areas and production facilities.
- Enforced relocation of communities
- O Impact of disaster may setback much of the growth/development attained over years



DISASTER MANAGEMENT POLICY

- There must be a well-thought link between development and disaster management policy
- Two important points
 - Most government departments have a connection with disaster management
 - Departments involved in development have no role in day-to-day disaster management activities

DEVELOPMENT AND DM POLICY

Prerequisites

- Clear recognition by government of repercussions of disasters
- Clearly defined disaster management policy
- Clear allocation of disaster management responsibility at Ministerial level
- Maintenance of effective DM capability
- A national disaster management office

- National Disaster Management Council
 - Chaired by the Prime Minister
 - Ministers and Secretaries of Mo Agriculture, WR, Finance, LGRDC, Communication, HFW, Food, Home, DMR, River Transport etc.
 - Chiefs of armed forces
 - Secretary of Cabinet Division, Member-Secretary

- Inter-Ministerial Disaster Management Coordination
 Committee
 - Chaired by Minister of DMR
 - Secretaries of Cabinet Division, Mo Agriculture, WR, Finance, LGRDC, Communication, HFW, Food, Home, DMR, River Transport etc.
 - DGs NGO Bureau, DMB, DRR, BDRC

- National Disaster Management Advisory Committee
 - Chaired by an expert
 - MPs, representatives from government institutions, universities, NGOs, Donor Agencies, experts, BDRC Chairman, FBCCI President, IEB President, Insurance Company Association President, Krishi and Grameen Bank, DG DRR, DG DMB (Member-Secretary)

- Union Disaster Management Committee
- Upazila Disaster Management Committee
- O District Disaster Management Committee
